Dear Holy Rosary Friends and Families,

Sacred Scripture has an underlying unity and each of its parts are inseparable from the whole.

Often, both believers and unbelievers alike read the individual books of scripture or their individual sections as separable self-contained units. The unity within biblical books and among these books themselves can be hard to grasp even for the trained exegete. However, when we consider the development of different themes throughout Sacred Scripture as a whole and their specific trajectories, we start apprehending a structure that is not reducible to the sum of its parts, we start to see Scripture as a whole. Treating Sacred Scripture as a whole and the truth of Scripture as a function of the whole is crucial because it shows the function of the various purported contradictions between the texts. It is true that these contradictions are often exaggerated, but a case can be made for them even if they are only apparent. For example, much of the Old Testament wisdom literature seems to have a different view of justice and prosperity than Ecclesiastes or Job. Indeed, Ecclesiastes infamously appears to not even support the idea of an afterlife: "For the living know that they will die, but the dead know nothing; they have no further reward, and even the memory of them is forgotten." (Ecclesiastes 9:2-6) We also have the imprecatory psalms that seem to conflict with the prophets and Gospels: "Happy shall he be, that taketh and dasheth thy little ones against the stones." (Psalms 137:9)

Bracketing the question as to whether the contradictions are real or apparent, we can see that attending to the literary structures proper to Sacred Scripture as a whole reveals the function of these conflictual texts: struggling for truth with God, debate, and the progressive revelation of God—these are literary structures proper to the Scriptural narrative as a whole.

When reading Plato, we are not troubled by the characters disagreeing amongst themselves. Some or all the characters in the dialogue may be uttering false statements, but that does not render the text itself false, since the whole function of the text is to work out the truth through the debate. By analogy, the conflict between different sections of the wisdom literature has a positive function when considered in light of the whole. These different traditions are right in some respects but not fully correct or incomplete in other respects. The conflict only resolves in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus presented in the New Testament-the Old Testament texts are steppingstones to Christ. Likewise with the conception of justice present in the imprecatory psalms and the witness to the dark and vengeful aspects of human existence. True, we find a desire for justice, but this desire is incorrectly or imperfectly expressed.

Sacred Scripture is inspired in all its parts and is inerrant in all its parts. However, the parts of Sacred Scripture are not integral parts of Scripture if we take them as separable from the whole. In that case they are simply source material and not really part of Scripture as Scripture. The parts of Sacred Scripture, taken as inseparable parts of the whole, differ in meaning from these parts taken as separable units because scriptural meaning is a function of the whole. Inspiration and inerrancy are said of the Scriptures as a whole and the parts as a function of the whole. Hence, when we read any scriptural passage, we need to consider the passage in relation to the entire Scripture which is unified. As Christians, we believe that God only spoke one Word, that Word who became flesh in Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ reveals God in His very person, and that revelation of God comes to us through Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition. Hence, it is Jesus Christ Himself, the Word of God, that constitutes the unity of the Scriptures. Hence, the primary interpretive lens for reading Scripture is the revelation of God through Jesus Christ.
