Dear Holy Rosary Friends and Families,

This past week, August 8th, our Order celebrated the feast of our holy founder, St. Dominic. For this Sunday's Masses we have repeated the liturgical celebration so that the entire parish can join in the festivity.

St. Dominic was born in a small farming town north of Madrid, Calaruega, in about 1170. His father and mother were of the minor nobility. It was his mother, Blessed Jane of Aza, who had the famous dream that has given rise to the main iconographic symbol of St. Dominic, the hound with a torch in its mouth. During the time she was pregnant with Dominic, she dreamt of giving birth to a hound carrying a torch that ran throughout the world, setting it on fire. The dream so troubled her that she went to a local monastery and spoke to one of the monks about it, who was inspired to announce that the dream was prophetic. It referred to the child she was carrying in her womb, who would one day be a great instrument of the Holy Spirit, spreading throughout the world the flame of divine love. This is the image that in turn was carried over into the Dalmatians that decorate our stained-glass windows. The black and white coloring of the Dalmatian breed ties in well with the black and white habit of the Order, although the early artistic renditions of the dog portray it as a dark gray or black hound. At any rate, just about everyone visiting the chapel wonders about the Dalmatians and what they represent, giving the opportunity for us friars to tell this story of his mother's prophetic dream.

If we skip forward to years later, after Dominic had been ordained and was traveling in the south of France with his bishop, we have the beginning of this prophecy being fulfilled. That region had seen the rapid growth of the Manichean religion, drawing both nobility and common folk, laity and priests, away from Catholicism to belief in a dualistic view of all reality. Everything material, from the beauty of nature to wine and food, from our very existence in the body to the human body of Christ, was evil, the product of an evil god. Only spiritual reality is good, our souls, heaven, the angelic spirits—all of this the creation of a supremely good god of spirit. The goal of our lives in this world is to free ourselves from the shackles of bodily, material existence, and go off to the world of spirit, which for those who have attained the highest spiritual perfection involved suicide.

Dominic eventually dedicated himself full-time to debating with members of the strange heresy, rescuing as many as possible from trap of thinking that all our problems as humans, all our internal struggles with greed, strife and the rest of the vices, can be blamed on the material things that surround us, and of which we are made. A small group of priests gathered around him, dedicated to preaching the truths of the faith, bringing out in word and through charitable outreach, the beauty of Christian belief. These

were the men he eventually formed into the Order of Preachers in 1216, followers captivated by the flame of his charity validating the prophecy given years before, as one of the brethren who knew him well related:

[His] cheerfulness is what enabled him so easily to win everyone's affection, for, as soon as they looked at him, they were captivated. No matter where he happened to be, whether on a journey with his companions or in the house of a stranger, or even in the presence of princes, prelates, or other dignitaries, his conversation was always edifying and abounded with allusions which would draw his hearers toward love for Christ and away from love of the world. At all times his words and his works proclaimed him a man of the Gospel. During the day, none was more affable, none more pleasant to his brethren or associates (Jordan of Saxony, Libellus 104).
