Dear Parishioners:

This coming weekend our Novices will be arriving and sharing their vocation stories with us. This suggested to me that it might be an ideal opportunity to describe what a novice actually is. If you are unaware of the distinction, Religious priests like ourselves are different from Diocesan (a.k.a. Secular) priests—and not merely in dress. Those of us who publicly profess the Evangelical Counsels of Poverty, Chastity, and Obedience according to a Rule and Constitutions of a particular Order all start out as Postulants. That is, for a specified time we live with a Religious Community and discern whether we should enter (for me it was 11 days). At the end of this period we are offered the opportunity to enter into the Novitiate. This is a special time, one year and one day, (and often two years for sisters and nuns) where we are granted the opportunity to live as a member of that same Religious community to continue our discernment in a real and intentional way.

The Novitiate year is one of learning, trial, and error. It's a time of dedicated prayer and consultation. It's a time set aside from "the work" of being a Religious (monk, canon, friar, sister, etc.) to focus on developing the habits necessary to live Religious Life well and to make a personal discernment about whether the Holy Spirit is confirming your choice to enter this or that particular Order, Congregation, Institute, etc. It's the spiritual equivalent of trying on the outfit before you make the purchase. It is also a time for the professed members of the religious community to make a similar judgment about you and the working of the Holy Spirit from the perspective of the Order. After all, every relationship, and entering a religious order is a real relationship, is always two-sided.

Secular priests are not afforded a year like this in their discernment. Usually they go directly from their worldly life to the Seminary where they spend the next 4-8 years studying those things necessary to be a parish priest. We male Religious focus less on studying those things necessary to be a priest, but rather, study those things necessary to be a good Religious and to dive into the academic disciplines in which we may find interest or to which we have been assigned. Those Religious, however, who are to be ordained priests must also study those things necessary for the priesthood. However, for a man to become a religious is not to automatically commit to becoming a priest. Even if he is ordained a priest there is no forgone conclusion that such a priest will ever serve in pastoral ministry. Priests of Religious Orders are ordained first and foremost for the needs of the Order and secondarily for the needs of the wider Church.

During the Novitiate it is the responsibility of the Novice Master, a qualified priest in our case, to instruct the Novices on basic religious etiquette, customs, and rules. They are given courses in the meaning of the vows they seek to profess and other basic courses to aid their discernment about the Order and increase their knowledge in the faith. However, the most important classroom is found in the convent. It is there, living in Christian unity, with professed members of the community that the Novices learn what it is to be a Religious in general, and this sort of Religious, in particular. In other words, just like
