

Dear Holy Rosary Friends and Families,

Seeing God face to face in heaven (the beatific vision) and living a good life on earth are connected. It might seem that God could have decided to give eternal life even to people living a sinful life on earth, but that He simply chose not to do so. However, if we think more deeply about the relationship between life in heaven and life on earth, we can see how this cannot be the case.

Seeing God in heaven and living a good life on earth are connected because living a good life means becoming more like God, in whose image we are created.

Only God can properly see Himself face to face. Seeing God face to face in heaven is to share in God's vision of His own face. When we become more like God, we see more like God sees, which finds its culmination in a sharing in God's vision of Himself.

The problem with so many pastoral approaches today is that they do not speak about how living in a sinful manner is living contrary to our nature, the nature which is not only like God but an image of God. Such a sinful life excludes one from seeing God in heaven, not because God has simply decided not to reward such people with eternal life, but because a sinful life excludes one from the beatific vision in principle and by necessity.

Moreover, God's all inspiring power does not extend to impossibilities, as if God could make a square circle—it is simply a contradiction. So, if people live a sinful life and die, not even God could admit them to heaven—it is simply an impossibility and a contradiction. Truly, those who live a good but imperfect life can be purified in purgatory, but those who live an evil life cannot enter heaven after they die. Today we hear much about "welcoming." Everyone indeed is welcome in our Church. However, our welcoming of others into the community is also a welcoming of them to conversion and seeking intimacy with the Lord, and in that sense, all are indeed welcome in this place.

It is not charitable to only welcome them into the community while refraining from welcoming them to conversion and the intimacy with God that conversion brings. How could we not welcome them to conversion when they cannot attain salvation while living a sinful life? They cannot obtain salvation while living a sinful life because, since their life is sinful, it is profoundly unlike God's life. Therefore, they will not be able to see as God sees, much less share in God's vision of His own face in that face to face intimacy with God in heaven.

It doesn't matter how we feel about this situation any more than it matters how we feel about 4+4 equaling 8. The connection between living a good life and the vision of God in heaven is as certain and necessary as the above equation. If we do not also welcome people to conversion, they will say to us at the Last Judgement: "You welcomed us, but why didn't you also warn us?" We cannot say: "We were only focused on welcoming you into the community. We didn't think welcoming you to conversion was important."

Such a pastoral approach is not in the interest of those we ought to welcome—it is more about how it makes *us* feel, which is selfish, profoundly uncharitable, and a dereliction of pastoral duty.

Pastors must not incur the condemnation of the prophet Ezekiel:

"My shepherds did not go searching for my flock. Instead, the shepherds fed themselves, and my flock they would not feed!'..."Watch out, I'm coming after you shepherds! I'm going to demand my sheep back from them and fire them as shepherds. The shepherds won't be shepherds anymore when I snatch my flock right out of their mouths so they can't be eaten by them anymore." (Ezekiel 34: 8,10)
